Grace, mercy, and peace to you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

As I write this letter from my desk, it is hard to believe that it has already been 8 months since my arrival at Grace Lutheran Church. And looking back on this time, I can say for certain that God blessed me greatly when He placed me at this congregation. Grace has been so welcoming in receiving their new pastor, especially one straight out of the Seminary.

Indeed, just one year ago I was still in the classroom studying and preparing to serve as an under-shepherd to God's people. And now having been ordained and installed at only 25 years old, I am currently the youngest pastor in the Atlantic District of our Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. No pressure! Yet, Grace Lutheran did not reject me because of my youth. Instead, you all believed what I believe about the Divine Call: it was God Himself who sent me here to serve.

As your servant, I will work hard to continue the mission of our church: to strengthen the flock of believers and to care for our community. I hope that you will keep me and our leadership in your prayers as we move forward by the Spirit of God!

And speaking of moving forward, we have something new in the works here at Grace. You are currently reading it! Striving to be a Servant My Journey through the Atlantic District Lay Diaconate

I never really thought of myself as "Deacon material", but in December 2019, when one of our Deacons, David Santos, left to accept a call to Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Middle Island, there was a void created, and a great deal more work was placed on the shoulders of our remaining Deacons, Tony Vasell and Ed Ritzmann and our vacancy Pastor, Charles Bell. David gave me a book to read -"Deacons: Servant Models in the Church". He asked me to consider reading and praying about it.

Later, I began to participate in worship service as a Server. Ed, Tony and Pastor Bell began a bit of a mentorship process with me (as well as with Patrick Doyle). About 8 months later, Patrick and I were approached about applying for the Atlantic District Lay Deacon Training program and begin two years' study. I was a little reluctant to start what I thought would be a lot of commuting to evening classes; I hadn't done anything academically in about 35 years (I stopped college because the commute while holding a full time job was exhausting), and had concerns about financing this venture. But Ed and Tony explained that the financing would be made available through the congregation (if they approved my candidacy), and that, because of COVID, the program was to be administered through ZOOM, a "virtual" classroom. After some discussion with Lynn, I agreed to begin the program.

What followed was two years of college level study, ten six week units of continuing education. Each class was accompanied by a healthy dose of textbooks to read, unit final assignments / papers, and written reflections about what we learned. Time to exercise that gray muscle that resides between my ears. Well, you know how the education piece turned out; Patrick and I completed our studies in May 2022 and received our diplomas in August 2022.

What remains for us now is this: the completion of 200 service hours, with a minimum of 20 hours in each of the following five categories - Visitation, Teaching, Administration, Evangelism, and Liturgical Service. Then, a written report of the service performed, which is submitted to the Atlantic District Office, a final interview is scheduled with the Supervising Pastor, Regional Vice President, and members of the Advisory Committee. Upon passing the interview our names are forwarded to the Atlantic District Board of Directors, for final approval.

This has been a very rewarding experience all along; this congregation's support and encouragement are heartfelt and deeply appreciated. I look forward to the day when I am commissioned as a Lay Deacon, and will be ready, willing, and able to continue to serve my congregation and my Lord.

I was raised in a traditional Catholic home. We went to church, said grace every night with our meal and our prayers at night. I was baptized, made my communion and confirmation, went to CCD classes but never felt like it was all there was. I knew of the Trinity but never understood it. I knew that Jesus died for our sins but I kept searching for the empty spot to be filled. I was never introduced to the bible even though my parents had a beautiful one with pictures displayed in their bedroom.

I was married in the Catholic Church I was brought up in and my children were baptized and made communion and confirmation in the Catholic Church we joined when we moved to Shirley. I taught CCD classes and went to church almost every Sunday and my boys became Altar Boys. I was still feeling empty. Randy was raised Presbyterian and I admired his knowledge of the bible. Randy

I tried another Catholic Church but I was still not filled. So then a dear friend brought me to Grace Lutheran one Sunday. I was overwhelmed with the kindness shown me on that very first visit. I came home and told Randy I think I found my home. We started to attend regularly and slowly my heart grew more and more filled. I had been in a bible study with some Catholic friends so I was learning more and more through the word but at Grace Lutheran I began to learn to live the word.

My daughter who was 9 years old loved attending Grace Lutheran and being involved in Children's Church and all Youth activities. My sons, who were Confirmed teenagers, didn't want to leave the Catholic Church which saddened me but Pastor Ernst advised me to just lead by example and they will find their way.

I never knew exactly what it was I was searching for during all those years but I know without a doubt I was searching for God's grace in my heart and life. I needed to understand that Christ died for ME. Through God's grace I was forgiven which allowed me to be renewed in heart and mind. This saving grace allows us to live the life God wants us to experience and share with others. In 2 Corinthians 12:9 Paul tells us that the Lord said "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness". In my weakness I knew nothing of the Lord's salvation and grace for all those years but I can now boast as Paul did that in my weakness may the power of Christ rest upon me.

I'm a sinner but through Grace (Church) I received God's grace which I am so grateful for every single day of my life. I pray you also have found God's grace and salvation.

She has been the Chair of Social Ministry, Council Secretary, Council Treasurer, Chair Of Fellowship and now Chair of Worship. Liz has been our Church Secretary since 2007. Liz feels that she has a better understanding of many of her office duties due to working with so many Boards over the years.

2 Corinthians 4:8-12 We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be manifested in our bodies. For we who live are always being given over to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus also may be manifested in our mortal flesh. So death is at work in us, but life in you.

Believe me when I tell you, I don't cry "pretty". Just this past week, I found myself "crying ugly" due to life's circumstances. Once again, stress and anxiety cut me off at the knees.
