Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ! There is so much to say but I am not even sure where to start.

I have been attending Grace Lutheran Church since 1991. I had started dating Erin, my wife, in September and attended my first service at Grace Lutheran Church on Thanksgiving Eve of 1991. I saw it as another opportunity to spend time with Erin and fell in love with Grace Lutheran immediately. It was the music that kept me coming. Although I did not know it at the time, this was the beginning of my journey with God. I came from the Catholic Church and attended Catholic school. That experience was definitely different. In 2008, Ocean Medical was acquired by Henry Schein, a Fortune 500 company, whom I still work for today. Believe me I had my fears of facing this giant! One reason was that I did not have a high school diploma, and this company requires at least a bachelor's degree to do the job that I do. But a man named Frank Rivas told me, "we did not hire you for your college degree. We hired you for your ability and your accomplishments." And with that, I continued my career and

now I am one of the top sales reps. I do, however, take immense pride in the fact that after seventeen weeks of night classes, I received my high school diploma. I received it the same day my

daughter Emily graduated high school.

I am grateful for my wife Erin and what she had to sacrifice so that I was able to move my career forward. Erin and I were blessed with two amazing daughters, Rebecca in 1998, and Emily in 2001. Just recently, Re-



becca was married and we gained a wonderful son Richard. I am so very thankful for all these blessings in my life.

I LOVE being able to serve this congregation and I thank you all for putting up with me and allowing me to serve you! I know that my tenure as vice president and as an officer is coming to an end in the next year. It saddens me, but I am very grateful for all your support in my years of service. All I have been given is a gift from God! I cannot even begin to tell or show you my immense gratitude towards all of

An Untamed Tongue

Surrounded by powders, lipstick, and blush she felt anything but beautiful. Events of yesterday played in her mind like a broken record. How could those words have fallen from her lips? The sharp barbs could not be taken back nor unheard from her friend's ears. Who was she kidding? She would never consider me a friend again. Oh, the pain I must have caused her! Why did I ever say that?

We were all having such a good time, talking about work, life, and family. The air was filled with laughter as we shared stories of younger days and how we got to where we are today. With my defenses down, I felt so close to my friends all around me. Somehow, the guard on my tongue slipped and was now somewhere shoved away in my back pocket.

"Whoever desires to love life and see good days, let him keep his tongue from evil and his lips from speaking deceit (1 Peter 3:10)."

It's so easy for me to fall into the ugly pit of gossip. It's almost like putting on a comfortable pair of shoes or a cozy sweater on a cold day. I'm an expert at asking seemingly innocent questions to elicit responses that lead down an alluring pathway of hidden secrets, finding out things I'm not supposed to know and not supposed to pass on to anyone else. Like a well-oiled door, I push open a discussion we aren't supposed to have, as we talk about things we only half know, and come to made-up conclusions we then declare as facts.

It happens so quickly—this falling into a whirlwind of gossip. The fallout is devastating. Trying to rebuild, heal, and re-establish the friendship can be near impossible, and usually the cracks in the foundation of the friendship remain forever.

These half-truths can break a person's heart, kill a friendship, dissolve years of trust, and erase any integrity I may have had before the words spewed from my pie hole.

Words! Words are meant to encourage not tear apart. They can be filled with grace or hate. They can give life or destroy. Words can injure, but they also can heal. And I needed to use my words and begin to beg my friend for her forgiveness.

"A soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger (Proverbs 15:1)."


Pushing my embarrassment aside, I picked up my phone, called my friend, and asked if she would meet me somewhere to talk. She had every right to ignore my call or even to slam the phone down in my ear. But she didn't!

Being more grace-filled than I ever could be, she suggested we meet at a local café. I would be walking blind, not knowing what to expect, or how she would act. She had every right to rip me apart with her own words, even as I begged her to forgive me for mine.

With a churning stomach, I prayed for God's strength as I put my hand on the door of the café, pulled open the door, and hoped that forgiveness was waiting for me inside.


